- To assist workers with the necessary skills to establish goals and acquire the confidence and training to make a successful contribution to society.
- To engage workers in workforce activities that increase employment retention and earnings ability by the attainment of nationally recognized and/or post-secondary credentials.

Our Programs

A. Scholarship Program

The Alabama State Conference NAACP Labor and Industry Committee sponsors an Annual Essay Writing Contest. The essay contest is available to students in grades sixth through twelfth. Essays are divided into three categories, middle school students (grades 6 to 8), high school students (grades 9 to 11), and graduating seniors. Only high school graduating seniors can compete for scholarships. Two scholarships are awarded in all three categories. Prizes are awarded to the top three essays.

B. College and Career Readiness Program

The CCR Program stimulates economic opportunity and mobility, encourages entrepreneurship, expands quality educational opportunities, and promotes workforce development for communities in Alabama.

C. Apprenticeship Program

Apprenticeships help businesses thrive by creating highly skilled, highly productive employees - and it helps workers start careers that pay higher wages. Adults, young adults, and high school students are presented with the chance to apprentice in select areas. Labor and Industry and local businesses form partnerships to help the workforce system increase worker skills, meet employer needs, and raise performance outcomes.

Research shows youth apprenticeship programs help participants make quicker transitions from school into the labor market, while gaining valuable career skills.

About 94% of apprentices that are trained through a registered apprenticeship program stay with that employer earning, on average, about \$70,000 a year upon completion.
